

## **Technical Appendix 10.3: Heritage Assets within the Outer Study Area**

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This Technical Appendix (TA) provides details on the heritage assets recorded in the Outer Study Area<sup>1</sup> together with an assessment of their heritage sensitivity and of the potential effects of the Proposed Development on their settings.

This TA should be read in conjunction with EIA **Chapter 10: Cultural Heritage (EIA Volume 4)**, Section 10.4: Baseline Conditions and Section 10.5: Assessment of Effects. The locations, and extents, of the recorded heritage assets are shown on **Figure 10.2 (EIA Volume 2)**.
